

Malabar Farm State Park



Malabar Farm State Park: Malabar Farm in Pleasant Valley was the dream of the Pulitzer Prize-winning author, Louis Bromfield. Today, visitors can see the house and farm existing just as they did in Bromfield's time. The outbuildings and pastures still house chickens, goats and beef cattle. The hills are ribboned with strips of corn, wheat, oats and hay while the scenic trails are adorned with nature's bounty.

Mohican Memorial State Forest: Hiking trails wind through the primitive and scenic areas of the forest and park. These trails lead to such attractions as Pine Run Creek, the Fire Tower and Clearfork Gorge.

Millersburg: Amish country begins somewhere east of Loudonville. There really is no official "boundary." Millersburg, like many other towns in the region, is a busy crafts center where visitors can rub elbows with the Amish who come to buy supplies and sell their wares. You'll find shops with leather goods, furniture, woolens, and hand-made quilts.

Berlin: The heart of Ohio's largest Amish settlement. Come enjoy the beautiful serene setting, slower paced lifestyle, and amazing home cooked meals!

Sugarcreek: One can take a step back in time at the Alpine Hills Historical Museum on Main Street with its displays that depict the early days of the community, including an Amish kitchen and a 1890's cheese house. Sugarcreek's German and Swiss roots can still be seen in its Old World charm, industrial scenes, and Amish farm country.

Schoenbrunn Village State Memorial: Schoenbrunn Village is the site of several Ohio first settlements, church, schoolhouse and code of laws. The village, restored to appear as it did more than two centuries ago, includes the original cemetery and 16 reconstructed log structures, as well as the church and gardens. A visitor center with museum and introductory video will help orient you so that you can experience the village.
